## Stay safe around tracks and trains

### Soon, more trains will travel along the Foxboro Line. Follow these two rules to stay safe:

#### 1. Stay off the tracks and the land around the tracks. Being in these areas is illegal and dangerous.

The tracks and land around the tracks is called the right-of-way (ROW). The ROW is private property. Being on or near the ROW is very dangerous. It is also trespassing. Anyone in these areas is breaking the law.

- Never walk, run, play, take pictures, or stand on the tracks or on the land around the tracks (ROW).
- Anyone standing on or near the tracks may not hear or feel a train approaching in time to get away safely.
- It is impossible to outrun a train or for a train to stop quickly. Because of its weight, it takes a mile or more for a train to stop.

#### 2. Cross only at designated crossings, and cross safely.

Designated public crossings are known as grade crossings. A grade crossing is a place where a railroad and a road or two railroad lines cross at the same level. Grade crossings are the only safe place to cross the tracks.

To cross safely:

- Be aware that trains are about three feet wider than the tracks on each side, so be sure to stay well back.
- When lights begin to flash, slow down and stop yourself or your vehicle a good distance from the gates and tracks.
- Never drive or walk around a lowered gate.
- Don't drive across a grade crossing until you know you can get all the way across it. This is especially important when in traffic. Never stop a vehicle on a grade crossing when waiting for traffic to move.
